Part	Audio Format	Questions
Part 1	Everyday conversation (2 people)	10
Part 2	Social / general monologue (1 person)	10
Part 3	Academic discussion (2–4 people)	10
Part 4	Academic lecture / monologue (1 person)	10

* Total Test: 40 questions (30 minutes listening + transfer time)

☰ Questions 31 to 40

Part 4 contains the final ten questions of the listening test. It is designed to test your ability to follow an extended academic presentation.

⚠ CRITICAL IELTS RULE

You hear the recording ONE TIME ONLY. There are no repetitions or second chances.

How Is Part 4 Different from Part 3?

Key structural differences between the two academic listening sections

Feature	Part 3	Part 4
Speakers	2 to 4 people (Students & Tutor)	1 Speaker only (Lecturer / Expert)
Audio Format	Interactive discussion / debate	Continuous monologue / lecture
Mid-section Pause?	✔ YES (Pause after Q35)	✖ NO PAUSE (Q31 to Q40 continuously)
Context	Coursework & tutorial planning	University-level research presentation

Why Is Part 4 Harder?

The monologue is uninterrupted, language is strictly formal academic English, and speaker pace is steady without back-and-forth prompts.

Strategic Imperative

You MUST preview **all 10 questions (Q31–Q40)** during the preparation time at the beginning.

Who Is Speaking & What Do They Do?

Understanding speaker roles and speech functions in academic presentations



University Lecturer

Delivering an introductory talk or topic overview to university students.



Academic Researcher

Presenting new findings, fieldwork results, or study methodologies.



Subject Specialist

Explaining a specific phenomenon, historical trend, or technology.

Common Speech Functions

- Explaining a theory
- Comparing two things
- Giving practical examples
- Describing a process
- Outlining reasons & effects
- Making future predictions

GOLDEN FOCUS QUESTION

"What is the speaker talking about right NOW?"

Topics shift logically. Focus on main ideas and main transitions rather than trying to understand every single word.

Common Part 4 Lecture Subjects

All topics are general academic subjects — no prior technical knowledge required



Science & Nature

Environment, animal biology, habitats, climate



History & Design

Ancient history, architecture, inventions



Business & Society

Workplace psychology, management, sociology



Health & Mind

Sleep patterns, human behavior, nutrition



Technology

Engineering, new discoveries, innovation

TYPICAL LECTURE INTRODUCTION

"Today, we are going to look at how urban infrastructure in coastal cities has adapted over the last century..."

Reassurance for Test Takers

You do **NOT** need specialist background knowledge. Every single answer is stated directly or indirectly within the recording itself.

Part 4 Question Formats

Note completion dominates, but other task types can appear

90% OF ALL TESTS

Note / Summary Completion

Filling in missing words in structured lecture outline notes. Headers organize the content logically.

🔑 Key skill: Identifying word form & grammar requirement before listening.

OTHER POSSIBLE TYPES (~10%)

- ✓ **Sentence Completion:** Filling gaps in stand-alone sentences.
- ✓ **Multiple Choice:** Choosing A, B, or C (rare in Part 4).
- ✓ **Matching Tasks:** Categorizing features or findings.
- ✓ **Flowchart / Diagram Labelling:** Tracking a process.

🔍 Essential Pre-Listening Analysis

Before the audio begins, always ask yourself: "What type of word goes in this gap?" (e.g., number, date, singular noun, plural noun, adjective).

Note Completion: How It Works & Strict Rules

Mastering the standard Part 4 question layout

SAMPLE NOTE COMPLETION FORMAT

Urban Tree Planting Initiative

Background & Aims

- Project started in response to high levels of **31**
- Primary goal: reduce urban heat island effect.

Key Findings

- Most successful species required minimal **32**

🚫 Non-Negotiable Rules

- 🕒 **Check Word Limit:** e.g., "*ONE WORD ONLY*" or "*NO MORE THAN TWO WORDS*".
- 🕒 **Copy Exact Words:** Do not alter word forms or tense.
- 🕒 **Grammar Fit:** The filled sentence must be grammatically correct.

⚠️ SPELLING WARNING

Incorrect spelling = 0 marks! Always double-check standard UK/US English spelling.

Following the Academic Lecture Structure

Use section headings on the question paper as your visual map

01

Introduction

Topic definition & main thesis statement.

02

Main Point 1

First core argument or historical background.

03

Main Point 2

Secondary finding, cause, or theory.

04

Examples

Case studies, data, or practical application.

05

Conclusion

Future outlook & final summary takeaway.

Section Headings Are Your Anchor

Section headings on your question paper match the speaker's outline. When the speaker moves to a new heading topic, you know immediately which questions to look at.

What If You Lose Your Place?

Scan down to the next main section heading on the paper. Listen for key vocabulary related to that next topic to re-anchor yourself.

Signpost Words: Verbal Roadmaps

Transitions and signals that indicate where the talk is going

STARTING / INTRO

- "Today I'm going to talk about..."
- "Let's begin with..."
- "First of all..."

MOVING TO NEW POINT

- "Turning now to..."
- "Next, let me turn to..."
- "Another key aspect is..."

EXAMPLES & RESULTS

- "For instance / For example..."
- "A clear illustration of this is..."
- "As a result / Therefore..."

CONCLUDING

- "To sum up..."
- "In conclusion..."
- "Finally, we must note..."

Pro Strategy Tip

When you hear a signpost word, pay immediate, sharp attention — it signals that the speaker is moving to a new key detail or question answer!

Predicting Missing Information

Analyze context around gaps to anticipate answer types

EXAMPLE 1

"The study lasted for ____."

✓ Predict: **Period of time** (e.g., three years, six months, 2 decades)

EXAMPLE 2

"Researchers collected ____ from local residents."

✓ Predict: **Plural or uncountable noun** (e.g., samples, data, feedback)

EXAMPLE 3

"The species primarily lives in ____."

✓ Predict: **Location / habitat noun** (e.g., caves, rainforests, wetlands)

Target Checklist Questions

- > Is it a **Number / Date / Measurement**?
- > Is it a **Proper Name / Location**?
- > Is it a **Singular or Plural Noun**?
- > Is it an **Adjective / Describing Word**?
- > Is it an **Action Verb**?

** Prediction builds focused listening target mental filters — it narrows down what to listen for!*

Synonyms & Paraphrasing

The recording rarely uses the exact words written on your question paper

Question Paper Text	What You Hear in the Recording
causes damage to	harms / destroys / impacts negatively
increased quickly	grew rapidly / rose fast / escalated
important factor	key element / significant reason / crucial component
mainly used for	primary purpose is / used predominantly to
problem / difficulty	issue / challenge / obstacle / setback

 Core Rule: Listen for Meaning, Not Sound Match

If you wait to hear the exact words written on the exam paper, you will miss the answer. Train your ears to listen for matching **ideas and concepts**.

Handling Distractors & Corrections

Recognizing when speakers correct or modify information

TYPICAL IELTS AUDIO TRAP

"The project was originally planned to launch in June, but due to severe supply delays, it finally got underway in September."

Initial Mention: June (Distractor) **Final Answer: September**

BUT / HOWEVER

Signals a direct contrast or change coming.

ACTUALLY

Signals a self-correction or true fact.

INSTEAD

Shows an alternative option was selected.

IN THE END

Confirms final outcome or decision.

💡 **Takeaway:** Never write the very first piece of information you hear without listening to the complete clause!

Specific Details: Numbers, Names & Spelling

Precision is essential for securing marks in technical notes

📉 Number Traps

Be careful with '-teen' vs '-ty' pronunciation:

13 / 30 | 15 / 50 | 16 / 60

🔊 Similar Letters

Listen closely during spelled proper names:

B / D / P | M / N | F / S / X

🔊 Homophones

Ensure grammatical context fit:

affect / effect | there / their

🧠 What If You Hear an Unfamiliar Academic Word?

Stay calm. Write down phonetically what you hear based on English spelling rules. Do not panic or give up listening.

Common Mistakes & How to Fix Them

Overcoming typical test-taker pitfalls in Part 4

Common Student Mistake	Pro Fix Strategy
Trying to understand every single word.	Focus strictly on key question keywords and main ideas.
Missing one answer and stopping to think.	Move on immediately! The next answer is already playing.
Waiting to hear the exact words from the question.	Listen for synonyms and paraphrased meanings .
Losing place in the extended talk.	Use section headings & signpost words as navigation markers.
Choosing the first piece of information mentioned.	Listen for change words (e.g., <i>however, actually</i>).
Leaving blank spaces on the answer sheet.	Always guess! There is no negative marking in IELTS.

Complete Part 4 Strategy: Step-by-Step

Your step-by-step framework for test day execution

🕒 PHASE 1: BEFORE AUDIO

- ✓ Read all 10 questions (Q31–Q40).
- ✓ Read main section headings.
- ✓ Underline key nouns & verbs.
- ✓ Check word limits carefully.
- ✓ Predict required word types.

🎧 PHASE 2: DURING AUDIO

- ✓ Listen for signpost transitions.
- ✓ Look at current AND next question.
- ✓ Focus on paraphrases & synonyms.
- ✓ Watch out for distractors / change words.
- ✓ Move on instantly if you miss one.

✍️ PHASE 3: AFTER AUDIO

- ✓ Check spelling accuracy.
- ✓ Check singular vs. plural forms.
- ✓ Verify word count limits.
- ✓ Fill every blank (never leave empty).

"Your goal: You do not need to understand every word. Follow the speaker's ideas and capture the specific answers the questions demand."
