What is IELTS Academic Writing Task 1?

Essential Test Requirements

- You are presented with visual information (data, process, or map).
- You must **describe, summarize, or explain** the information in your own words.
- **Minimum word count:** 150 words (no upper limit).
- **Recommended time:** ~20 minutes (out of 60 mins total).
- **Weighting:** Contributes 1/3 to your overall Writing score.

Core Purpose & Tone

- **Strictly Objective:** Report only what is shown—no personal opinions.
- **Academic Tone:** Neutral, formal prose with clear organization.
- **Selective Focus:** Highlight key trends rather than listing every number.
- **Accuracy Matters:** Misinterpreting data directly lowers Task Achievement.

 **Key Message:** Your job is to communicate the most important information clearly—not to describe every single data point on the page!

The Four Categories of Visual Data



Dynamic Trends

Line graphs & Bar charts showing change over time (years, months, decades).



Static Comparison

Pie charts & Tables comparing proportions or categories at a single point in time.



Process / Diagram

Natural cycles, manufacturing workflows, or how an object/device functions.



Spatial Maps

Geographical plans illustrating urban development, expansion, or relocation over time.



Note: Tasks can feature a single visual or a **combined graphic** (e.g., a pie chart paired with a line graph).

The Proven 4-Paragraph Structure

PARAGRAPH 1

Introduction

Paraphrase the prompt in 1–2 sentences using synonyms and rephrased structures.

PARAGRAPH 2

Overview

Summarize 2–3 overall trends, key features, or major contrasts. **No specific figures here!**

PARAGRAPH 3

Body Paragraph 1

Report specific data points, highest/lowest numbers, and major comparisons for Group 1.

PARAGRAPH 4

Body Paragraph 2

Report secondary trends, remaining categories, or subsequent steps for Group 2.



Flexibility: While 4 paragraphs work for 90% of tasks, adapt logically for processes or dual charts.

The "Golden Rule" of the Overview

★ What is a High-Band Overview?

- A clear summary of the **overall picture** of the visual.
- Identifies general trajectories (e.g., overall increase/decrease).
- Highlights main contrasts or dominant categories.
- Must be written **without quoting specific numbers or dates**.

⚠ Examiner Scoring Penalty

Without a clear overview, you CANNOT score higher than Band 5.0 in Task Achievement!

An overview proves to the examiner that you understand the big picture and can synthesize visual information efficiently.

📞 **The Phone Test:** Imagine describing the visual to a friend over the phone in 15 seconds. What 2 key facts would you mention?

Precision Language for Trends & Movement

Verbs of Movement

Increase / Rise / Grow

Surge / Soar / Rocket

Decrease / Fall / Decline

Plummet / Plunge / Drop

Fluctuate / Oscillate

Level off / Plateau

Adverbs of Degree & Speed

DRAMATIC / RAPID

Sharply

Dramatically

Steeply

GRADUAL / MODERATE

Steadily

Gradually

Marginally

A Grammar Variety: Combine Verb + Adverb (*rose sharply*) and Adjective + Noun (*a sharp rise*) for higher Grammatical Range.

Language for Comparison & Figures

Comparative Structures

- *"Significantly higher than..." / "In stark contrast to..."*
- *"Twice as many as..." / "Three times higher than..."*
- *"The vast majority of..." / "A negligible share..."*
- *"Whereas X increased, Y experienced a steep decline."*

Reporting Proportions & Figures

- **49%** → *"Almost half" / "Just under 50%"*
- **75%** → *"Three-quarters"*
- **32%** → *"Approximately one-third"*
- **20 → 40** → *"Doubled in volume"*

 **Accuracy Rule:** Accurate simple language is always better than sophisticated inaccurate language!

Deconstructing the Prompt & Visual

1. WHAT?

Identify the main subject, variables, and units of measurement.

e.g., Electricity consumption in Megawatts;
Population in millions.

2. WHERE?

Check geographic locations, countries, or specific facilities.

e.g., Comparing four European countries: UK, France, Italy, and Spain.

3. WHEN?

Determine the timeframe to select your primary grammar tenses.

e.g., 1980–2010 (Past tenses); 2035 projections (Future structures).

 **Strategy Framework:** Always apply four steps: **Select** key features → **Report** accurately → **Summarize** overview → **Compare** data.

Selecting & Grouping Data Effectively

❌ The "Data Dump" Pitfall

Trying to describe every single bar, point, or category on a crowded chart.

- Creates a disorganized list of numbers.
- Prevents clear high-level comparisons.
- Lowers Coherence & Cohesion scores.

✅ High-Band Grouping Strategy

Combine related categories into logical thematic body paragraphs.

- Group by highest vs. lowest categories.
- Group by upward vs. downward trends.
- Group by similar patterns or anomalies.

💡 **Rule of Thumb:** If a visual has 12 categories, group them into 2–3 meaningful clusters rather than writing 12 sentences.

Correct Tense Selection & Fact Control

Past Tenses

Dates in the past (e.g. 1995–2010)

Use **Simple Past** ("*sales rose*") and **Past Perfect** for prior events ("*had doubled by 2005*").

Present Tenses

Processes or timeless facts

Use **Present Simple** ("*the water enters the valve*") or **Present Perfect** for recent changes without dates.

Future / Projections

Future projections (e.g. 2030)

Use modal phrases: "*is projected to rise*", "*is predicted to reach*", "*is expected to plummet*".

 **Forbidden:** Do NOT invent reasons or speculations for data changes (e.g., "*sales fell due to the economy*"). Stick strictly to given facts!

Describing Process Diagrams

Core Principles & Grammar

- **Passive Voice is Essential:** Focus on the action rather than the actor (e.g., *"The tea leaves are picked and dried"*).
- **Overview Requirement:** State the total number of stages and where the process starts and finishes.
- **Linear vs. Cyclic:** Identify if it's a natural cycle or a man-made manufacturing process.

Sequencing Connectors

- **Initial Stage:** *"First of all," "To begin with," "The initial stage involves..."*
- **Intermediate Stages:** *"Subsequently," "Following this," "Simultaneously," "After being filtered..."*
- **Final Stage:** *"Finally," "In the ultimate step," "The process culminates in..."*

 **Key Insight:** Unlike data charts, process diagrams require describing every stage in sequential order!

Describing Map Comparisons

Spatial & Directional Language

- **Compass Directions:** *"In the north-east corner," "To the south of the river."*
- **Relative Position:** *"Situated adjacent to," "Located parallel to," "Positioned opposite."*
- **Overview Focus:** Summarize overall transformation (e.g., urbanized, modernized, industrial to residential).

Development & Change Verbs

- **Addition:** *Constructed, erected, introduced, built.*
- **Removal:** *Demolished, knocked down, cleared, removed.*
- **Transformation:** *Replaced by, converted into, transformed into.*
- **Expansion:** *Expanded, enlarged, extended.*

 **Map Strategy:** Compare features between the two periods rather than describing Map A completely and then Map B separately.

Avoiding Common Academic Pitfalls



Giving Personal Opinions

Never explain why you think data changed. Remain strictly descriptive and objective.



Essay Conclusions

Do not write a Task 2 style opinion conclusion. An Overview paragraph is all that is required.



Copying Prompt Wording

Words copied directly from the question prompt are deducted from your total word count.



Under-length Writing

Writing fewer than 150 words results in a heavy penalty in Task Achievement.



Note: Responses must be written in full connected prose, never use bullet points, tables, or numbered lists in your final text!

The 20-Minute Exam Execution Protocol

0-3 MINS

Analyse

Read prompt, identify What, Where, When, units, and key features to group.

3-5 MINS

Plan

Draft your Overview statement and decide paragraph groupings for body data.

5-17 MINS

Write

Write introduction paraphrase, overview, and 2 body paragraphs with exact figures.

17-20 MINS

Check

Verify 150+ words, data accuracy, tenses, spelling, and paragraph logical flow.



Time Management Warning: Task 2 contributes TWICE as much to your final grade. Never let Task 1 exceed 20 minutes!

Academic Task 1 High-Band Checklist

Structure & Content Checklist

- ☐ Did I paraphrase the prompt in Paragraph 1?
- ☐ Is there a clear, prominent Overview paragraph?
- ☐ Did I select key features instead of listing all numbers?
- ☐ Are figures and data points reported accurately?
- ☐ Is my tone strictly objective without personal opinions?

Language & Execution Checklist

- ☐ Did I select appropriate tenses (Past/Present/Future)?
- ☐ Have I used a mix of verb/noun trend structures?
- ☐ Did I use passive voice for processes / spatial terms for maps?
- ☐ Is my word count at least 150 words?
- ☐ Did I complete the task in ~20 minutes?
